

The Piano Owner's Heads-Up Guide to Important Piano Maintenance

Focus On: Polishing Imitation Ivory Keytops



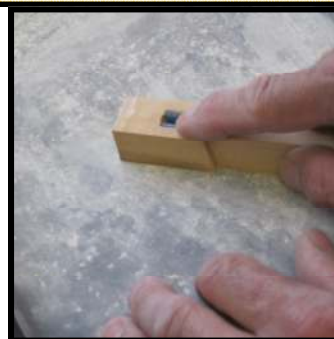
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Over decades of use, artificial ivory keytops begin to show their age and tend to make a piano as a whole look old and beat-up. A hard-to-remove layer of grime causes keys to have an unsavory look that makes a piano less appealing to play. **The keytops on your piano have reached the point where more than a typical cleaning is needed to do the job right.**

To bring the keyboard of your piano back to life, I would suggest treating your keys to a professional cleaning and polishing. The result will be a set of keys that look much more like they did when they were new. Your keytops will feel silky smooth, and will invite you to sit down and play.

The first step in returning a sheen to worn keytops is to carefully hand-sand the layer of oxidation and grime off the top of the keys using fine grades of wet/dry paper down to a extremely fine 2500 grit.

Following this painstaking process, each keytop is buffed to a high sheen using a special polish and a soft cotton buffing wheel at low speed



Once your keys have been professionally cleaned, you will find that keeping them looking nice will usually require just a quick swipe with a soft, lightly dampened cloth.

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
